Lansing House Histories

Five homes on our block (and about fifteen others in Lansing to the best of my knowledge) were "installed" in 1955. In response to the building boom of ranch houses in those years to provide affordable post-war housing, the H.L. Cooper Corporation located at 2801 W. 9th Avenue in Gary, Indiana, offered these homes. What is unique about them is the manner of construction. They built the home structure, entirely finished, in a huge building in Gary that was formerly used to construct and repair railroad engines. This "round house" had a huge turntable.

The houses were built on the engine platforms or spokes of the huge machine that resembled a giant "lazy susan". On each rotation, another part of the house was completed. This was to be an assembly line of efficiency and cost saving with all the trades and materials centralized in one location and out of the weather. The exteriors were lapped masonite, and the windows were the 'awning' type.

The original models in Lansing were shown at Burnham Ave. and 178th St. We believe 4 or 5 models were offered. About seven of these homes are still there today. We picked out model 1056-Special. The homes cost between \$14,500 and \$16,900 with three bedrooms and one bath, and included the basement.

After we paid our down payment and picked out our lot at 18639 Sherman, the basement was dug and built with concrete blocks. On completion of that, a Model 1056-Special, 24' by 44', was transported from the Gary roundhouse on a huge tractor-trailer and lowered onto the existing foundation. Pretty amazing stuff! Instant house! The Cooper Corp. connected the utilities, installed the furnace, put in sidewalks and graded the 57' by 124' lot, and the rest is history! (We remember when we entered the house for the first time, and found a displaced field mouse in the bathtub.)

Fifty-three years later with many upgrades and additions, plus a garage, we still remain in our beautiful home and neighborhood. We raised two wonderful children here and participate fully in our community. We are retired now and the house is the perfect size again, as it was in 1955. We're not aware of how long the Cooper Corp. built these

homes. The 186th block of Sherman and Henry Streets have seven of the homes. Another group are at Burnham and 178th, and others are scattered around town. Most have been modernized but are still basic ranch houses.

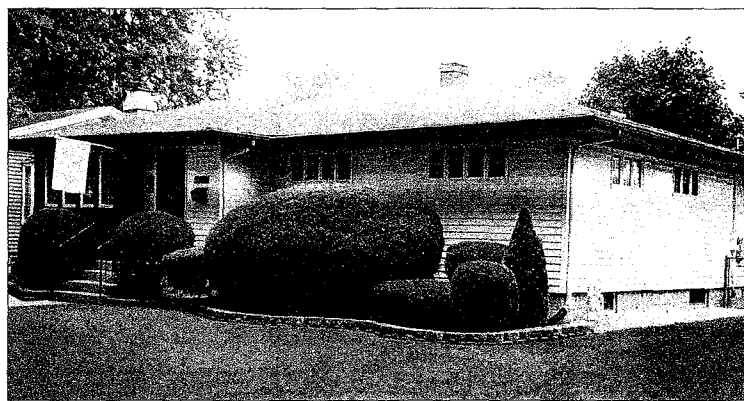
We remember that the only two choices we had were the linoleum colors in the kitchen and bathroom. Everything else was standard. Upgrades were non-existent in those days. These homes were very well built for the money, and we have enjoyed remaining here as the rest of the world moved on and changed around us.

The Lord has blessed us, and we realize we are an endangered species of sorts, being able to remain in the same home these wonderful fifty-three years.

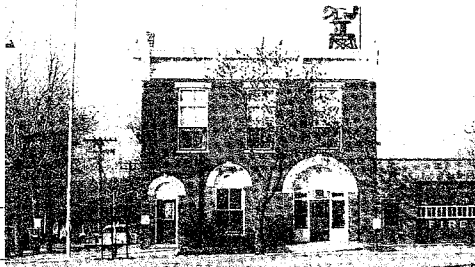

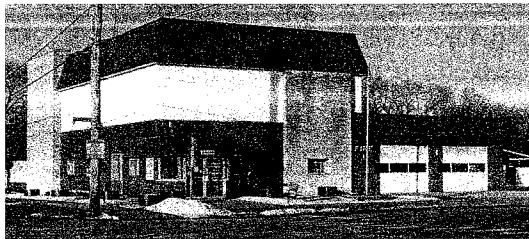
The Lansing Village Hall was built in 1894 on the corner of Lake and Henry Streets. All of the village departments had offices there. In 1945 the Village Hall gained an addition for the Fire Department.

In 1976 the Village Hall was remodeled and the Police Department took over the entire downstairs, when the Clerks Office moved to Ridge Road and Chicago Avenue. Court proceedings were held in the upstairs room of the Village Hall.

A new police station and courtroom were built in 1991. At the present time the Building Department, Fire Station # 1, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Fire Prevention Bureau are all located in this 114 year old Lansing building.

There have been many different groups that have used the upstairs for their meeting place.

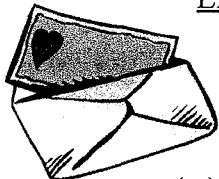
